





This month we highlight the Ursuline Sisters of Louisville with a submission from their

miles east of the city on the Louisville & Shelbyville Branch Turnpike, which is now called Lexington Road. At the time, the property was on a stretch of farmland that offered enough room for a new academy and Novitiate, with plenty of room to Mother Martina had great foresight in acquiring the land, but even she probably could not have realized just how fruitful her purchase would be for her community. In the nearly 150 years since she bought the first parcel of land, the Ursuline Campus on Lexington Road has grown to 48 acres and housed eight Ursuline-founded schools, four of which are still on campus today as Sacred Heart Schools. In 1917, the campus became home to the congregation's current Motherhouse and Chapel. The evolution of the Ursuline Campus and Sacred Heart Schools is detailed through a timeline installed last October as part of a new Heritage Room in the Motherhouse. The opening of the Heritage Room corresponded with the 145th anniversary of Sacred Heart Academy, the first school on campus. While the archival collection of the Ursuline Sisters of Louisville will ultimately have a home at the Women Religious Archives Collaborative, the history of the congregation and the schools they founded will be showcased permanently on campus through the Heritage Room.
